You Can Help Province Lake

It's been 5 years since Province Lake's Watershed Survey, and AWWA would like to reconnect and take another look at potential water quality threats to your lake. A lake watershed is the area of land surrounding a lake that slopes towards the waterbody. When stormwater and snow melt travels across



land, we call it runoff. Runoff happens when we build roads, houses, lawns and driveways. These impermeable surfaces do not absorb runoff. Stormwater runoff picks up pollutants such as soil, sand, fertilizers, pesticides, manure, and petroleum products. *Even common soil is a pollutant*. It contains phosphorus, a nutrient that acts as plant food, causing aquatic plants to grow excessively. Runoff can also contain harmful bacteria, viruses and toxic materials picked up from the land.

It's important to be aware that activities and land use around the lake directly impacts water quality. Not only do we want a healthy lake to recreate in,

but studies have shown that a decrease in water quality has a direct impact on property value. The purpose of the Watershed Survey back in 2013 was to locate erosion sites on private property, roads and other developed areas that may be having an impact on Province Lake's water quality. We've addressed many erosion and pollution issues that were identified in the survey, but there's more work to be done.

To date, AWWA has conducted 60 technical assistance visits with private landowners. Of those 60 visits, 29 turned into Youth Conservation Corps (YCC) projects around Province Lake. There are over 200 properties on Province Lake, but we've only connected with a portion of the landowners. The good news is that there's still so much more that can be done to keep Province Lake healthy!

Signs of erosion on your property:

- Gullies or channels through your yard
- Pine needle movement
- Exposed tree roots
- Bare soil

You should also be concerned if your road or driveway:

- Crosses an intermittent or perennial stream
- Is located on a steep slope
- Is close to the lake
- Has eroding ditches

Province Lake Watershed Management Plan Lorie Dunne, PLA

Province Lake has a Watershed Management Plan as referred to above by Amy in how 'You can help Province Lake'. This plan is a comprehensive approach to understanding our lake and the challenges we face in keeping it as natural and healthy as possible. The plan was developed in 2014 and it continues to guide the PLA and others in selecting and completing numerous projects around the lake. The conclusion is that watershed residents, landowners, business owners, and recreationalists alike should have a vested interest in improving the long-term water quality of Province Lake so that everyone can have access to clean water that is free of toxic cyanobacteria blooms. The objective of the Province Lake Watershed Management Plan is to reduce the probability of nuisance algae blooms in Province Lake by reducing the in-lake total phosphorus concentration 3.5 ppb TP (a 25% reduction from the median, summer in-lake concentration, over the next 10 years). Reducing TP in Province Lake from 14.3 to 10.8 ppb will have costs based on which tasks in the action plan are executed. Implementation of this plan over time has, and will require the dedication of state and municipal employees, watershed groups, and volunteers to ensure that the actions identified in this plan are carried out. Spring Cleaning and a Healthy Lake

Spring is arriving and with it spring cleaning. After a snowy and cold winter, it's a welcome opportunity to get out and do some clean up and prep for the summer that awaits us. We would ask you to consider a few things to help protect our lake as you clean up around your property.

Please sweep up any areas that have leftover winter sand and remove it to areas away from the lake. If you have leaves, garden cuttings and other plant debris, please do not deposit it into the lake. Remove it from lakeshore areas and consider composting or mulching it. Sand and leaf/plant litter introduced to the lake waters can cause serious issues to water quality, fish and aquatic life, and can facilitate harmful algal, bacteria and invasive plant growth.

Also identify areas that have experienced erosion and address them to prevent further soil erosion into the lake. If the problem is serious, contact AWWA as discussed in the accompanying article.


About the PLA


