Loon chicks? Wait until next year.

Those of us that love to watch and hear the loons on our lake and look forward each year to seeing one or two loon chicks, will need to wait until next year.

Although we have had an adult pair (and a single loon) on the lake since just after ice out in early spring, they have failed to lay any eggs this year, thus no chicks were hatched. The floating nest was launched in early May, but with no eggs as of late July, it has been removed from the lake.

Loons in NH typically incubate their 1 or 2 eggs between late May and early July, for a period of 28 days. In 2015 we had 2 eggs laid on June 29 and hatched on July 27; in 2017 we had a single egg laid on June 3 and hatched on July 1; and in 2019 we had a single egg laid on June 14 and hatched on July 11. On the other years (2016, 2018, and 2020) they laid eggs that failed to survive/hatch.


At this time of year, loons that are not raising chicks become social, and visit other loons on other lakes. Don't be surprised if some day you cruise the lake and determine that our pair is off on a social visit, ... or if you see 4 (or more!) loons on our lake as other loons without chicks this year come here for a visit.

Membership Drive

To all of you procrastinators out there, -- Your *Province Lake Association needs your help!* We have had a good year with new and returning members, but there are a number of you that have been members of the PLA in previous years that we have not heard from yet in 2021. And if you are not sure if you have joined this year, please check our website where we keep an up-to-date listing of this year's members. If you misplaced the membership letter sent earlier this summer, that's fine, - the PLA mailing address is PO Box 24, Effingham, or you can pay the membership fee via PayPal.

To all paid 122+ families that have joined this year, thank you. And this would be a good time to ask your lake friends and neighbors if they are members. We would love to set a new record for member families in 2021.

We operated in 2020 at a small net deficit and are hoping that increased membership will put us back in the black. Our major expenses are a) Lake Host payroll, helping us maintain our unique status of milfoil free, b) our partnership expenses with AWWA, NH Lakes, LPC, UNH water quality monitoring, and MMRG, and beaver population control in the South River as we work to achieve a healthy balance between wildlife and lake water level.



The Province Lake Association Board – What do we do and who are we? How does the PLA do what it does? We have a dedicated and tireless Board who loves the lake and works hard to keep it healthy. The Association was established to educate, communicate and coordinate with its members and the community to protect, preserve and improve the quality of Province Lake and the wildlife and habitat associated with the lake. We believe that collectively we are better able to recognize and respond to issues as they arise.

The Board is responsible for oversight of the Association by assuring we follow the rules of 501 (c) 3 non-profits to maintain our tax deduction status so that 100% of PLA membership fees and donations can go into projects and related work focused on Province Lake water quality. We manage programs such as our NH Lake Host program and lake hosts and water quality sampling and analysis. We work with our partners such as Acton Wakefield Watersheds Alliance; NH Lakes Lay Monitoring Program; NH Lakes; NH DES; Green Mountain Conservation Group; and the Towns of Effingham, Wakefield and

Parsonsfield on mutual programs, provide outreach education and communicate information related to our mission.

We have fourteen board positions (four Officers and 10 Directors), of which eleven are presently filled. Our President is Lorie Dunne who will serve another year in the role, as will Jim Aiken, who is our Vice President and manages Membership. Thom Townsend as Treasurer manages our finances and Donna Luce is our Secretary and records our minutes. Their terms will end in 2022. Directors whose terms end in 2022 are Jon Samuelson and Tucker Vye. Pete Dinger, Mindy Schuman-Vye, Dennis Badman, Ryan Ruel and Larry Moody will serve as directors until 2023. Dennis, Ryan and Larry are new to the Board this year and we welcome and look forward to their leadership and contributions. Six of us are from Effingham and five from Wakefield (we'd love someone from Parsonsfield in the future!)

Many of our Board members have served multiple terms and we welcome new folks who would like to contribute. If you are interested in serving, please reach out to president@provincelake.org. We have a nomination subcommittee that will meet with interested individuals to discuss mutual interests and fit. Board members are elected at the Annual Meeting per our By-laws.
